It seems like just a few days ago, I was sitting at my desk preparing a Banner article for September. The older we get the faster time seems to pass by. I guess it's because a month is a smaller segment of our life and therefore it seems to pass more rapidly.

Message from the

PRESIDENT

We continue to have warm weather with showers coming almost every afternoon! Consequently, the grass in the park is very green and lush and weeds in flower beds and other areas are growing rapidly. Overall, this has been a more typical Florida summer as opposed to the very hot, dry summer we experienced last year.

I've learned that people read articles in The Banner! When I served as a Head of School, I wondered whether parents read the weekly newsletters we prepared and sent out! This was due to the number of calls we received asking questions about items that were covered in the newsletters. Last month, I incorrectly stated that plans were being prepared to have a ribbon cutting and dedication ceremony for the Veterans Garden in November on Veterans Day. That was not correct! Plans are being made to hold this ceremony in late January or early February when more of our residents are here, including the Veterans who served with Steve on the planning of the garden. We also hope the monuments for each of the branches of our armed services are in place by then.

The Board continues to work on several important issues. We are hoping to adopt some new policies for sheds at our meetings in September and we continue to explore ways to significantly discourage investors or agencies from purchasing units in our park for the sole purpose of renting them. This has been occurring in other parks and we would like to be proactive to keep it from happening in Golf Lakes. We also clarified the rule regarding political signs in the park to refer only to national elections, not local election days. Those who are here have seen the resurfacing of the main parking lot, along with new striping that has made parking spaces wider!

I have asked Karla Blevins to be the point person for finding candidates for the Board election. As usual we will have three positions up for election. Please consider putting your name up for the Board. It is a privilege to serve in this capacity. This park has always been dependent on volunteers, so I encourage you to consider this opportunity or the many other opportunities to make a difference in our park.

## Manager's Report



We are geared up for another season in Golf Lakes; and it is once again time to opt in to be included in the Park's Lawn Mowing Contract with Arbor Landscaping. Instead of contracts being mailed to all members, simply complete the contract included in this edition of The Banner or contact the office for a copy.



### THE DEADLINE TO SIGN UP FOR LAWN SERVICE IS NOVEMBER 1, 2024.

Arbor Landscaping is contracting to provide a higher level of service to include additional mowings and adding edging to every mow. There is also an option to add raking and removal of all grass clippings. Please note that opting in is a one-year commitment. Opting in or out after the deadline cannot be accommodated.



A new pool fence will be installed this month followed by securing loose pavers along with a final clean and seal of the deck. While our northern folks have been away, the pool has been performing well over the summer. We did start to see some black mold being transferred into the pool. We learned that folks who go to the beach should always wear a different swimsuit or wash their suit prior to

swimming in the pool. Black mold can be easily transferred from swimsuits, pool toys and even skin. Another important reason to shower before swimming.

On Wednesday, November 6th at 10:00 a.m. I will host the first *Coffee and Conversation*. This is an opportunity for members to come and ask questions about whatever is on their mind. I elect to participate in the Arbor Landscape Contract option for Lawn Maintenance, described below. I agree to make payments for this service to Golf Lakes' Residents Association, Inc. quarterly and at the same time as maintenance fees are due. Rate per quarter is \$148.50 with the first payment is due January 1, 2025.

\* THIS CONTRACT IS A ONE-YEAR COMMITMENT (*No opting out or in after the beginning of the year.*) \* <u>OWNER IS RESPONSIBLE TO PROTECT</u> ANY AREAS SUCH AS VINYL SIDING, OUTSIDE HVAC UNITS, WATER LINES, HOSE BIBS, TREES, SHRUBS, CABLE TV AND ELECTRICAL WIRING FROM MOWER AND/OR LINE TRIMMER DAMAGE BY PROVIDING SUFFICIENT SPACING AROUND ITEMS AND INSTALLING BORDERS. 2025 Cost is \$49.50 a month

INCLUDED

- Weekly Mowing (April through October).
- Bi-Monthly Mowing (November through March) Every effort will be made to get the grass cut as required, regardless of weather; however, if lawns are too wet to avoid damage, lawns will not be mowed and there will be no adjustment to the contract total.

With **EVERY** cut, the following will also be provided:

- Edge all streets, driveways, and sidewalks
- Line trim around home, trees and landscape beds. Owner must provide either adequate clearance or adequate protection next to siding and trees from line trimmer. Contractor not responsible for damage if no protection is present.
- Blow off debris and clippings the same day or next day if weather does not permit. Clippings and debris will be blown into lawn and not on to streets, drains, patios, or driveways. Care will be taken to keep clippings off vehicles and side of homes.
- Mowers mulch grass clippings, and bagging is not included. See Optional Raking Available for \$20/month Excessive grass clippings will be disbursed by blowing or double mowing to reduce clumping. All trash generated by the contractor to be removed at contractor's expense. During the growing season, clippings may be visible after mowing. Arbor is not responsible for grass blown into lawns by other contractors.

The following services are <u>not included</u>. Fertilization; Tree/Shrubbery Trimming; Tree/Shrubbery Removal; Weed Control or removal of weeds; Hauling Yard Debris including shrubs, branches, trees, trash, pick-up or removal of pet waste and/or dropped fruit.

**OPTIONAL: Q Rake and remove all grass clippings for \$20/month.** Weeds being the most prevalent ground cover, this option is available because they grow twice as fast as sod in the growing season and cause clumping.

## THE HISTORY OF HALLOWEEN - PAGE 1

### The History of Halloween: From Ancient Rituals to Modern Festivities

Halloween is a holiday known for costumes, candy, and spooky decorations. However, its origins are rooted in ancient traditions that date back over two millennia, blending pagan rituals, Christian observances, and various cultural influences to become the holiday we recognize today.

### **Origins in Ancient Celtic Traditions**

The earliest known roots of Halloween trace back to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced "sow-in"), which took place around the end of October. The Celts, who lived in what is now Ireland, the United Kingdom, and northern France, celebrated their new year on November 1st. This day marked the end of the harvest season and the onset of winter, a time often associated with death. The night before, October 31st, was believed to be a time when the boundary between the living and the dead was blurred. The Celts believed that on this night, the spirits of the dead could return to Earth.

Pope Gregory III moved the celebration of All Saints' Day, a day to honor saints and martyrs, to November 1st. The night before became known as All Hallows' Eve, eventually shortened to Halloween. This Christian holiday further assimilated elements of Samhain, blending the themes of honoring the dead with the idea of a "holy evening."

### **Halloween in America**

Halloween traditions were carried to America with the influx of Irish and Scottish immigrants in the 19th century. However, it wasn't until the late 19th and early 20th centuries that Halloween began to take on the more secular and community-based characteristics we associate with it today.



Initially, Halloween in America was more about community gatherings, where neighbors would share ghost stories, play pranks, and enjoy seasonal treats. Over time, these gatherings became more organized, evolving into the Halloween parties, parades, and trick-or-treating that are now central to the holiday.

### **Modern Halloween**

By the 20th century, Halloween had firmly established itself as a major holiday in the United States, becoming increasingly commercialized. The tradition of trick-or-treating, which likely originated from the medieval practice of "souling," where poor people would go door-to-door offering prayers for the dead in exchange for food, became popular in the 1920s and 1930s.

In addition to the United States, it has gained popularity in countries like Canada, the United Kingdom, and even Japan, where it is more about dressing up and parties than its original religious or harvest-related roots.

Card Games: How are they played Clubs: What you need to know If something interests you, check it out! Remember, nothing ventured, nothing gained

**BANANAGRAMS:** A fast paced game for 2-16 players loosely based on Scrabble using same type of tiles, but no board per se. Each player develops their own board and can arrange and rearrange the letters however they want as long as the arrangement contains all real words that are connected as they would be in Scrabble. Each player begins with 21 tiles drawn from the pile of face down tiles. A game usually lasts about 15-20 minutes and we play for about two hours from 1-3 pm on Saturdays in the Friendship Room at the Clubhouse from October-May. There is no fee to play and nothing to win but a lot of fun, laughs and a chance to meet other people.

**EUCHRE:** A trick-taking game for 4 players divided into two teams of two (partners sit opposite of each other). The goal is to be the first team to reach a predetermined score, typically 10 points. You earn points by winning tricks (especially all five tricks when going alone).

**CRIBBAGE:** Cribbage is a card game for 2-4 people in which each player tries to form various counting combinations of cards. Score is kept by moving pegs on a peg board to a total of 121 points. Math and strategy are involved. Anyone is invited to stop in and watch. If interested, private lessons could be arranged.

**HAND, FOOT & ELBOW:** A partner-based card game that combines elements of rummy and canasta. Players work to empty their hand by creating shared table melds, then pick up their "foot" as a new hand and continue play, then pick up their "elbow" and continue to finish play. The player with the most points at the end of four rounds wins.

**FEATHER YOUR NEST:** Similar to Bingo but played with poker cards. Each playing hand consists of 3 cards and you can play as many card sets at once as you like. If you cover all three cards in your hand, you win. This is a fast paced game and is a lot of fun so come out and join us for an evening fun and laughter

**MAHJONG:** A strategy game that originated in China and is played with tiles instead of cards. The game is played with four players, though there are variants with three players. The game requires 144 tiles and two dice to roll. The first person to match a hand of 14 tiles and call "mahjong" ends the game.

**HARMONY NOTES:** Harmony Notes is a three part harmony Women's Chorus. We enjoy singing a variety of music, from sacred hymns to popular showtunes. We rehearse weekly each Monday during our season and perform a few times each month at Social Hour and Vespers. We present an end-of-season concert in March at Golf Lakes, which is always a "sparkling" event. No cost to join-- only a love for singing.

**LADIES BIBLE STUDY:** We are a group of ladies who meet together to study the Bible. We watch a video by a well known Bible leader and have a short discussion afterwards. Our sessions are usually about 7 weeks long and women are encouraged to come to one or all 7 depending on their schedule. All women are invited to attend.

### NO BUTS IN THE BY-LAWS

The next section of the By-Laws concerns Mobile Home Site Requirements.

See the section below for the requirements per the By-Laws. If you need further information, contact Tracy Roux.

### VI. MOBILE HOME SITE REQUIREMENTS:

1. Members are responsible for the overall appearance of the mobile site.

- \* Sites shall be kept orderly, neat, clean, and free of litter.
- Watering, weeding, replacement of lawn by sod, grass seed, plugs, mulch, or stones, and general care of the lawn, planters, shrubs and trees are the responsibility of the member.
- \* No lawn shall be mowed before 7:30 a.m., or on Sunday.

2. Mobile homes shall be attractively maintained and comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, and regulations of state, county or Park, as from time to time amended.

\* Decorative skirting is required.

3. Residents planting trees, shrubs and flowers must first coordinate with management to avoid damage to underground facilities and for lawn maintenance and easement considerations.

- \* Management shall be notified of intent to remove trees.
- \* New trees are to be planted a minimum of six feet apart.
- \* All trees, shrubs, flowers, siding, and air conditioning units must be protected from weed -eater and lawn mowers with landscaping logs or concrete landscape edging, if the resident is on the Park's lawn mowing program.

4. Flowers, shrubs, and lawns may be watered only by hand held hose on the days designated by the State of Florida.

- No sprinkler system, set sprinkler or soaker hose will be allowed, except in the case of new sod or plugs which may use a soaker hose on a timer for 30 days with the manager's permission.
- \* Prudent use of water for all purposes should be everyone's first consideration.

5. All clotheslines must be the folding tree type and must be placed in the rear or side of the mobile home.

- \* When not in use, clotheslines must be taken down and put inside.
- \* No clothes shall be hung on unenclosed carports or patios.
- \* No clothes shall be dried outside on Sunday.

6. Only electric meters can be attached to electric panels/poles.

- No plantings or part of planting shall be within 4 feet of any electrical panel on the meter side or within 2 feet on the back side.
- \* A permanently installed screen, such as lattice, must be at least 2 feet away from the meter side and 1 foot from the backside of any electric panel.

7. Propane tanks must be hidden from view by a permanently installed screening, such as lattice.

- 8. There shall be no use of fire pits, chimineas, outdoor fireplaces, or similar open flame devices.
  - \* Tended charcoal and propane cooking grills are allowed.

9. There shall be no hot tubs allowed on the exterior of the unit.

10. Mobile home sites not maintained to standards satisfactory to the Association will be maintained by the Association.

\* A minimum fee of \$50.00 will be charged to the member for each service performed.

11. No fences will be permitted other than decorative screening which must be approved by the park manager.

12. Any clogging of the sewer line from the mobile home to the main line is the responsibility of the resident, who must pay for its cleaning or repair.

13. Only water soluble (biodegradable) items are to be flushed to prevent damage to the Association's lift stations.

14. The member is responsible for both the electric lines from the weather head to the meter and the meter to the home.

\* The Corporation is responsible for the poles and backboards.

15. Any member intending to remove his or her mobile home from the Park must give the Corporation thirty (30) days notice in writing.

\* Future plans for the vacant lot must be included.

16. All residents who will be gone more than 7 days must shut off water supply to the mobile home.

17. All residents who will be away any time for more than 7 days during official hurricane season (June  $1^{st}$  to November  $30^{th}$ ), must stow away all outdoor objects prior to leaving.

- \* This includes, but not limited to flower pots, grills, decorative statues, outdoor furniture, garbage cans, bicycles and rain barrels.
- \* If not stored properly or anchored permanently, all such items will be removed.
- \* If an expense is incurred it will be charged to the owner.

18. No new plantings are permitted in the easements along the Park's perimeter fence or wall.

\* Nothing is to be hung or attached to the perimeter walls or fences around the park.

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

### UNDERSTANDING THE EDRC (Exterior Design Review Committee)

The EDRC was formerly known as the "New Home Placement" committee. The name has been updated to better describe the responsibilities of this group. As a cooperative, Golf Lakes residents are mindful of how appearance affects value. It is the goal of the EDRC to protect the cooperatives members. Composed of volunteer residents, this committee plays a vital role in maintaining our community's architectural standards and assessing modification requests. Essentially, their dedication ensures homeowners take pride in the community's look, feel, and aesthetics. The Golf Lakes Operations Manual mandates the membership shall consist of six members, one of which must be a Board Member, plus chairperson(s), and the park manager; at least four of the members shall be full-time residents. Within the by-laws, five pages are dedicated to listings of what is approved (and what is not acceptable).

The reasons for the restrictions and descriptions affect virtually every part of the exterior of your home. Some restrictions exist to maintain the safety of the communal areas such as roads and cul-de-sacs. As an example, Article VII, Rule 3 outlines the planting of trees and shrubs. Without the oversight of the EDRC, a well-meaning resident might plant a tree that will send roots which could damage underground facilities or roadways.

EDRC is considered an OPERATING Committee which means (according to the Operations Manual) the Chairperson(s) is appointed annually by the Board, members are appointed for three year terms with no limit on the number of terms.

There has been much confusion about what is inspected by the EDRC. If the modification contemplated by a resident is OUTSIDE the mobile home, it must be reviewed. Architectural items such as carports, storage units, shutters, painting of driveways and pavings certainly fall into the committee's responsibility. Each modification is considered separately.

Let's look at some examples: When purchased, the home was surrounded by concrete curbing filled with gravel. After taking ownership, the resident wants to make some changes.

Modification	EDRC interaction
Remove the gravel & replace with artificial turf	This is architectural, approval is required
Install Shutters on all windows	The color and application of the Shutters requires an application
Install a 20 ft flagpole in yard	The placement may encroach on underground utilities, approval is required
Add a door at the rear of storage area	This affects neighbors, approval is required
A standard globe with decorative globe	No approval required
Install pavers on side of home	An application for modification is required
Flowers changed in the planters	No approval required

Forms for submitting a modification for review are available from the Office.

Approval for a modification has an expiration date. Upon completion of a change, the committee is charged to inspect the modification.

As a side note, By-Law VI, Item 2 states that vendor signs must be posted before construction begins and removed upon completion of the work
